Chairperson's Report

This year has been extremely challenging but also at the same time rewarding.

- Challenging in that in the history of carnival, we could not have foreseen the difficulties we faced this year. I have never experienced severe weather conditions and the issues it presented, but with the support of local authorities and the carnival committee the procession was allowed to take place.
- Rewarding in that we held the 1st Southeast Regional Conference which was a great success the evening closed with music and dance. On Carnival day that despite the conditions the true spirit of carnival carried on. With the severe weather conditions decisions had to be made very quickly. Cancelling the event was not an option for us as the coaches from the Isle of Wight and the coaches from London had called to say that they had already left and there were a number of children in their party. Some of the costumes had taken almost a year to complete so people wanted to brave the weather and what a fantastic sight it was to see the procession leaving the park.
- This year has been a learning curve and we will use the experience to review all issues
 relating to carnival and implement any recommendations once the safety team
 meeting debrief has taken place.

I was surprised by the attendance on the road when the floats went out, despite the conditions the people of Reading showed the true spirit of carnival by coming out and supporting those who braved the weather. As the local papers said what severe weather this **Carnival was hot**. I would like to thank you all who braved the weather.

To our sponsors Newmont Travel, Asda Tilehurst, SAS International on behalf of the committee we thank you once again for supporting us. Also special thank you to Veronica Caribbean Corner for the encouragement on the day, at 6.00am in the morning the first stall holder to arrive and set up. Once again Hillman ran our workshop where beautiful costumes were made, and we even had one of BBC Radio Berkshire presenters Louise Chandler attending the workshops who made a lovely costume which she wore on carnival day.

Conference Report



The First South East Regional Carnival Networking Event was held on Thursday 8th March 2007. This was commissioned by the Arts Council England (ACE) who approached Reading Community Carnival Committee and asked us whether we could host the event. As Reading was about to celebrate 30 years of carnival and it is easy to get to by public transport, it seemed appropriate that we take up the challenge.

Following a meeting with ACE, the committee appointed me as Project Manager. ACE had already decided that 21 South St, an arts venue in central Reading, would be the best place to hold the event.

The purpose of the event was to bring together "Carnivalists" from all over the South East. This would provide an opportunity to share ideas, discuss relevant topics, set up a South East Regional Networking Forum and have fun. ACE provided us with regional contacts for our target audience and we added our own.

The Committee was given a Budget of £8825 plus ticket sales, to cover the cost of the event. At the first meeting ACE gave us an outline of what they felt the day should look like. The outline included possible workshops, presentations and entertainment. It was important that the day reflected the range of carnivals in the South East including traditional English carnivals, community carnivals and Caribbean carnivals.

With the outline provided, I worked with the committee to design the publicity, make contacts, draft the programme and allocate the budget. The committee decided that the day should be fast and lively, reflecting the mood of carnivals. We wanted to use every available space at the venue and we decided that it should be decorative.

There were displays from a number of groups including an elaborate display of costumes from the Isle of Wight. There were also keynote speakers on topics such as Police & Licensing, The Role of the Press, Funding and Development and Opportunities for 2012.

There were 4 workshops which were allocated 20 minutes each. These were:

These were repeated after a short break to enable delegates to attend 2 workshops. There were over 80 delegates signed in and some that joined us later. The event ran from 11am to 11pm with a range of entertainment to complete the evening. Morris Dancers, Costume Dances, Steel Bands and a Soca band kept us dancing from 7.30pm.

As a result of the event, Reading Carnival Committee was pleased to welcome a number of new groups to its carnival in May. Despite the weather we had visitors from Luton, The Isle of Wight and London. They were each represented at the event. A full report including photos and details of the finance will be available shortly. The committee would like to thank the Arts Council England for giving us the opportunity and funding to host the event, the speakers and workshop facilitators, the groups who provided an amazing display of carnival arts and projects, the caterers, Reading Borough Council and the staff at 21 South Street. We also like to thank the delegates for joining us in what really was an enjoyable and informative event.

Costume Workshops

As a young girl growing up in Reading I used to watch the carnival procession passing the end of my street so I have memories of colourful floats, dancing and lots of music. Last year was a lot of fun when I was part of the procession but I didn't wear a costume so this year I thought I'd make more of an effort. It never occurred to me to get involved until Chairperson of the Carnival Pat Alleyne came on to my show in March where she invited me to the Carnival Workshop Classes to make a costume. I've always been into fashion and I thought it would be a great way to put my creative side to good use so I was glad to do accept the challenge.

At the time I thought it would be easy to put together a costume because it looks easy but luckily I had a lot of help. By attending the costume workshops I met Philbert who is the costume expert and he made me realise I had to think of a theme for the costume, the colours, the material that was needed and how I would wear the costume on the day. Seeing as I'm from Barbados heritage I wanted to make a costume that represents my culture so my costume will be in the same colours as the Bajan flag - blue, yellow and black. But I'll tell you – it was a lot harder than I imagined. Carnival costumes look beautifully colourful and effortless but this whole process made me appreciate how much work goes in to it.



I started the costume with 2 months to go and it was a tough few months to get everything done. Over time Philbert taught my how to stitch the costume together, decorate the head dress with feather's, gold card and sequins. My designs for the costume were difficult because I had so many ideas but I was given the idea by Philbert to customise a top that I liked so I could make it fit the theme. It was yellow and blue to fit the theme of the Bajan flag. For the skirt I made a Bajan flag out of blue and yellow material that matched. Philbert said I had to make a standard. I'd never heard of this before - it's a symbol that summarises your costume - you hold it as you march along in the procession. I decided to go with the trident symbol that appears on the Bajan flag.

So after 2 months the costume finally came together and I was ready for the big day. The costume classes gave me so many ideas and inspiration for my costume next year - but I've learnt my lesson...to start the whole thing earlier!

Treasurer's Report



I must admit that as I stood in Prospect Park at 7.00am in the cold with the rain pelting down and the wind blowing I thought that carnival day was going to be a complete washout. But I underestimated the strength of the carnival spirit! Everyone who turned up seemed determined to enjoy themselves despite the weather. The procession was tremendous and even though we could not erect the stage for the live show because of the high winds the DJ's from Choice FM kept the crowd jumping until 7.00 pm. Well done everyone!

Obviously the weather has adversely effected or financial position but having built up a small cash reserve over the last few years the committee is able to meet all commitments this year. The committee will investigate the cost of insurance to cover the fixed costs of staging Carnival this coming year.

Carnival was again awarded an Arts Council Grant to improve the artistic content of Carnival. A series of costume making workshops were run in the weeks leading up to Carnival Day, and contributions were made to Steel and Mas Bands taking part in the procession. The grant was also used to cover some of the costs of staging the Prince and Princess evening which was completely free to every one who attended.

We have an excellent working relationship with the Arts Council and were honoured to be asked to organise and host the 1st Regional Carnival Networking Event in March. The event was staged within the budget agreed with the Arts Council with a small surplus earmarked for costs of staging or attending future Regional Consultation meetings.

As this year was the 30th year of Reading Community Carnival the committee felt it was appropriate to stage a Carnival King and Queen Gala at Reading Town Hall. Although previous feedback had indicated that the community wanted the return of the King and Queen Gala, the attendance was pretty poor. However this did not prevent the contestants from putting on a fantastic show and the audience really showed their appreciation.

Several groups from outside Reading joined Reading Carnival for the first time this year and enjoyed it so much are planning to come again. The 31st Carnival could be even bigger and better, especially as the weather is going to better than this year. Well it couldn't possibly be worse!
